RESTORING THE REGION'S SHEEP LEGACY

- > 50% of domestic consumption is from imported lamb
- Access to grazeable acres is a barrier to grow the sheep industry
- The current demand and market price for sheep production is strong

SITE LOCATION & PRE-EXISTING CONDITIONS

- **Location:** 3,500-ac in Perry County, Kentucky
- **Reclamation history:** MTR mining, 15-year-old reclaimed site
- Available forages:
 - A mix of native and nonnative trees/shrubs & grasses
- Soil test for nutrient deficiencies/toxicities

Assessed Pre & Post Project Rating of 1 to 5

77% stayed the same or improved









BODY WEIGHT Measured Pre & Post Project



Ewes average weight gain of 10.9 lbs.





BODY CONDITION SCORE

Assessed Pre & Post Project Rating of 1 to 5 (emaciated, thin, average, fat, obese)

92% improved or stayed the same







FAMACHA SCORE (FS)

Assessed Pre & Post Project Rating of 5 to 1

91% improved by one point or stayed the same

SUMMARY OF PRELIMINARY FINDINGS

- 1. Sufficient water for sheep production can be achieved using conservation practice for rainwater collection
- **2. Forage stocks were sufficient to sustain the flock**
- 3. Guardian dogs are an effective means to prevent predation and protect the flock
- 4. Flock health can be maintained
- 5. Biosecurity protocols were successful
- 6. Invasive plant populations were notably reduced on the grazing land



LOOKING FORWARD...

- **Continued efforts** for small-ruminant grazing operations in Perry, Martin, and Whitley, County KY this summer (2024)
- Long-term goal: Expand grazing land base on reclaimed sites to result in **profitable small-ruminant production**
- **Ecosystem recovery** of reclaimed mined lands:
 - Restoring native forests
 - Rebuilding soil organic matter
 - Invasive species control
